Plenary 1: Opening Plenary

WISE 2.0: How to boost intercultural competence development abroad, at home and online

The Windesheim Intercultural Skills Explorer has proven to be a useful approach during a pandemic, both to intensify coaching for outgoing students as well as for facilitating internationalisation@home initiatives. In the various COILS, virtual projects and hopefully soon to be developed Blended Intensive Projects, WISE offers a valuable basis to start from. This plenary will highlight the various applications of WISE and will also offer food for thought when it comes to the challenges we currently face ourselves in our role as international educators and facilitators.

Workshop 1.1: Virtual Mobility / Collaborative Online International Learning (COIL)

COIL or Collaborative Online International Learning also commonly referred to as 'virtual mobility' or 'virtual Erasmus' connects accredited courses, linking the classrooms of two or more higher education institutions, each located in a different country or cultural setting. Through co-developed and co-taught modules, COIL/virtual exchange supports the development of 21st-century workforce skills and provides opportunities for applied learning experiences.

Even prior to COVID 19 there was growing international interest in COIL/VE. That interest has grown enormously since the pandemic began, partially because traditional exchange is going to be a much diminished activity in the coming year at a minimum but also the migration to online academic delivery (albeit out of necessity) is changing mind-sets and opening up more possibilities too.

COIL/VE holds enormous promise as an activity in its own right, especially for HEIs where the barriers to traditional physical mobility inhibit all bar marginal engagement. International best practice show that to function properly it need to be integrated into the academic programme and have as its focus the achievement of at least some of the current (or possibly adapted) learning outcomes. It need not necessarily be the sole focus of an entire module but can be more limited in its scope, at least initially.

Workshop 1.2: Internationalisation @ home through experiential learning in a 3^D environment

Sharing our experience with the virtual exchange program that we set up initially with universities from 7 different countries in 2020. The Virtual Exchange is a 7-week program centered around the world's first circular business simulation game, The Blue Connection. In teams of four, students compete against their peers. They negotiate, make trade-offs, and implement new strategies in a virtual environment. The challenge is to not only make the

company profitable, but also circular. Additionally, they enjoy a series of teambuilding activities, workshops exciting topics related to the circular economy, and get a real sense of the importance of cross-cultural experiences

Plenary 2: Erasmus without Paper (EWP) – the Erasmus Dashboard and the Online Learning Agreement (OLA)

ECHE holders 2021-2027 have committed to deploy all efforts in making the Erasmus Without Paper initiative a reality. New tools such as the Erasmus APP, the Erasmus Dashboard and the Online Learning Agreement have been deployed and should be of current use by Erasmus actors. The workshop proposes a hands-on process of testing the Erasmus APP, the Erasmus Dashboard and drafting a mock Learning Agreement over the OLA tool, so the partners can understand the process and help their home institutions in the process of adapting to this process that is soon to become mandatory to all institutions.

Workshop 2.1: How do our institutions deal with inclusion and diversity?

Inclusion and non-discrimination are important strategic elements of all EU programmes. In their application for the European Charter of Higher Education, all participating institutions in the Erasmus+ programme had to show how they integrate these principles into their strategies and how they apply them to their Erasmus activities.

Heiner Schulze, Diversity Officer at Hochschule Nordhausen in Germany, will give us a short introduction into the concepts of diversity and inclusion and their local legal context. Thereafter, he will shortly present how HS Nordhausen tries to integrate inclusion and diversity into its institutional strategy.

In the second part of the workshop, Max Schachner will share experiences and challenges IMC FH Krems has been facing with implementing "diversity and inclusion" principles and processes. The institution-specific focuses will be stressed.

In the final part, all workshop participants will discuss future prospects for inclusion in international HEI co-operation in the context of the COVID-19 crisis.

Workshop 2.3: Developing Global Skills through Virtual Exchange

HEs are therefore looking for more inclusive ways of developing students' global skills, and virtual exchange projects could make an important contribution in this context. However, VE is often misinterpreted. This workshop, therefore, aims to show what virtual exchange is (and what it isn't), how it can be used to foster global citizenship skills, and what the criteria are for a successful implementation of VE projects. We will present examples of successful projects but will also leave room for participants to share their experiences and discuss solutions to common obstacles.
